

Three new donation drop-off depots open in the Philadelphia area

Mid-Atlantic Mothers' Milk Bank celebrated World Breastfeeding Week 2018 in a big way by opening three depots in the Philadelphia area. Even better, the milk bank was able to partner with two fantastic nonprofit organizations that share our passion for improving breastfeeding rates and supporting nursing mothers.

The organization's team of Certified Nurse-Midwives, Nurse Practitioners, and Registered Nurses serve the needs of women throughout the lifecycle and believe that quality healthcare is a collaboration between provider and client. The birth center recently expanded its wonderful lactation services to include

women who are not birth clients of the center.

The Breastfeeding Resource Center is hosting depots at both its Abington and Wayne locations. Known as an innovator and leader in breastfeeding support, the organization provides an extensive number of services for new and expectant mothers, including classes and support groups, along with one-on-one consultations with lactation consultants (IBCLCs).

In addition to providing a convenient option for local approved donors, the depots are a visible part of the community which helps spread the word about the importance of donor milk.

Did you know?

For 80% of women, the left breast is larger than the right, but the right breast makes more milk. There is no correlation between this fact and hand dominance.

Milk Bank to offer drug testing and macronutrient analysis

Through generous gifts from the Henry L. Hillman Foundation and UPMC, the milk bank has added several pieces of equipment to increase capacity and enhance services. Among these purchases were a microplate reader to perform in-lab drug testing and a Miris Human Milk Analyzer.

Since mid-September, all donor milk pools are tested for a panel of ten drugs. Mid-Atlantic Mothers' Milk Bank is one-of-only-three nonprofit milk banks in the U.S. – the others are in Colorado and Texas – to drug test milk. We are happy to be able to offer this added reassurance for our facilities.

Macronutrient analysis is another long-awaited service in the region. Quantifying calorie, protein, fat and lactose content will allow NICUs to make informed fortification decisions and allow the milk bank to pool milk for specific targets. To date, there are no FDA approved macronutrient analyzers for human milk on the market. Sweden-based Miris is in the midst of an FDA application for its unit which has been used in hundreds of hospitals throughout Europe.

Milk bank staff members have completed training on the use of the Miris Unit and begun to analyze samples. The Miris unit is currently for investigational use only and the milk bank has an IRB and policies in place that are compliant with this designation. Over the next few weeks, the milk bank will begin to label certain batches with nutritional content values.

Until there is an FDA approved unit, the information printed on these labels will be from an independent nutritional analysis lab. The information derived from the Miris unit will be for internal investigational use only.



Did you know?

Breastmilk contains a high concentration of Human Milk Oligosaccharides (HMOs). While these sugars are not digestible by humans, they are the perfect food for beneficial Bifidobacterium! Since HMOs are so important for the formation of a healthy microbiome, all HMBANA milk banks use a gentle pasteurization method (Holder Pasteurization) to help protect them.
